



Prayer Diary

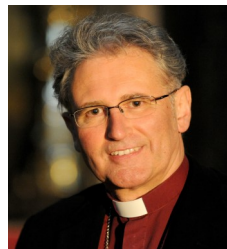
July 2020

'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.'

I've relied on the Lord's Prayer during this time of lockdown. It's sustained me in my own times of prayer and I've found myself leading others in praying the Lord's Prayer at almost every meeting that I've led on Zoom.

Every phrase has taken on a poignancy and power that seems to address the exact conditions in which we find ourselves. Now has most certainly been the time to pray for God's kingdom to come, for God's will for peace, healing and hope to be done on earth. When so many are suffering, and millions going hungry throughout the world because of the virus, praying for daily bread takes on a renewed urgency. And the same applies to every petition of the prayer, right through to its last, when, in the grip of an unseen enemy snaking through the world, wounding those who once seemed strong and killing the most vulnerable, our hearts are moved to plead that we are delivered from evil.

For me, though, it has been the first word that Jesus put upon our lips in prayer that has kept me going. Deprived of all those means of grace that have sustained the Church through the centuries since the earliest days when the first believers 'devoted themselves to fellowship and to the breaking of bread' (Acts 2.42), we have still been able to pray, 'Our Father'. Though separated in body, we are bound together in spirit by the Holy Spirit into the one Body of Christ – the Body that knows no boundaries through time and space, the Body that will for ever hallow God's name, the Body that puts its trust in the kingdom, the power and the glory of God that will prevail in every condition of human history.

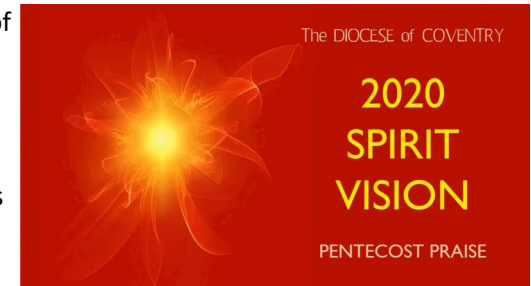

2020 Spirit Vision

At 6pm on Sunday 31st May, the Diocese of Coventry hosted a virtual Pentecost Praise service called 2020 Spirit Vision.

The service premiered on the diocesan YouTube channel and Coventry Cathedral's Facebook page and featured many different people from churches across the diocese.



The Dean of Coventry, John Witcombe introduced the service, with Laura Seago, churchwarden at St Mark's Fleknoe, and the Revd Alison Evans, Vicar of Holy Trinity, Attleborough, presenting.

There was worship led by Coventry Cathedral Chorus, St Mark's Coventry and a special rendition of Bethel Worship's 'Spirit Move' by churches from across the diocese. Bishop Christopher and Bishop John both spoke and prayers were led by the Offchurch Group.

2020 Spirit Vision was the diocese's first virtual celebration of Pentecost and so far the service has attracted over 1000 views.

Commenting on the impact the service had on him, Bishop Christopher said:

"I had really felt the loss of the Church not being able to gather together today to celebrate our birth in the pouring out of the Spirit on the Day of Pentecost. But the service lifted me high in joy and deep gratitude for all that God is doing among us, and for the wonderful people the Lord is using for his purposes."

Archdeacon Missioner, Barry Dugmore also said:

"[My wife] Suzanne and I felt our hearts warmed with the fresh touch of the Holy Spirit and encouraged with the reality that the Spirit of God is a missionary Spirit whose love and presence cannot be contained."

I cannot breathe

Strip me of this accursed Black skin, I want to live in peace!
I watched this video with emotions I can't describe.

As for this blue-eyed Jesus,

Bishops take the knee



On the 8th June, the Bishop of Coventry, the Right Reverend Dr Christopher Cocksworth, and the Bishop of Warwick, the Right Reverend John Stroyan 'took the knee' in front of the Charred Cross in the Cathedral Ruins to mark two weeks since the death of George Floyd in the USA and to support the Black Lives Matter movement.

Before kneeling for 8 minutes and 46 seconds (the length of time a US police officer knelt on George Floyd's neck), the Bishops recited the Coventry Litany of Reconciliation.
