Creation Care and Net Zero are parts of the same jigsaw puzzle ...

As a Diocese – including churches and schools - we can be advocates of the net-zero by 2030 goal. Will we, prayerfully, recognise that drastic action is necessary to reduce and mitigate the worst impacts of climate change? As a church we could be well placed to see the moral and ethical arguments and to stand with vulnerable, impoverished and deprived communities, working for social justice. It is important to set ambitious targets to accelerate the transition to renewable energy sources. Let us pray that as we aim high this can inspire collective action and spur the use of new technologies and policies. Colin Angus adds: "Remember that switching to renewable tariffs (away from fossil fuel tariffs) is an example of a quick win."

What does Net Zero mean?

Put simply, **Net Zero** refers to the balance between the amount of greenhouse gas (GHG) that's produced and the amount that's removed from the atmosphere. It can be achieved through a combination of emission reduction and emission removal. Net Zero is the intended outcome of decarbonization. It will be achieved when we purposefully reduce our use of fossil fuels, lower our overall use of energy and invest in renewable energy. This investment can either be through our own direct action or by careful selection of energy suppliers who are committed to reducing their carbon footprint.

General Synod is backing action to tackle the biodiversity crisis
Introducing the debate, the Bishop of Norwich, the Rt Revd Graham Usher
emphasized the impact of the devastation of UK biodiversity – with 26% of
mammals facing extinction, 97% of wildflower meadows lost since the
1930s, and 41% of species in decline since 1970 >>>>

The motion passed by General Synod in February 2024 stated: 'That this Synod, recognizing the need to respond urgently to the ecological crisis, in line with the global scientific consensus that the climate change and biodiversity loss crises are intricately linked:

- a. welcome the work being done by the Church Commissioners, the NCIs, and many dioceses, parishes, cathedrals, and schools to manage all or part of their land for climate and nature, in urban and rural communities alike
- b. request **Diocesan Secretaries** to task a named person/committee in their dioceses to create an action plan to achieve the 'Land' section of Eco Diocese at Silver level by 2026 at the latest.
- c. request Chairs and Secretaries of **all diocesan property/finance committees** to incorporate nature-positive objectives into their asset management policies within the next 6 months.
- d. call on all parishes, cathedrals, TEIs, NCIs offices with land they manage or influence to:
 - create a simple land management plan, with reference to the guidance and examples from **Caring for Gods Acre**,
 - work towards an increasing level of **Eco Church**, including the actions in the 'Land' section, and
 - record the biodiversity of their green spaces, through taking part in **Churches Count On Nature** each year.
- e. call on all **Diocesan Boards of Education** to work in accordance with the Department for Education Sustainability Strategy.
- f. request the Church Commissioners to report back to General Synod within three years about their own progress ... in achieving these objectives.'



I-sing-pop Diocesan Partnership

Emma has begun working with schools. Thanks for completed one day workshops at: Lent - St Margarets (Whitnash), Radford Semele, St Nicolas (Nuneaton) & Bidford on Avon; Easter - Bishop's Tachbrook, Abbey Infants (Nuneaton). She also supported with St John, Coventry After School, "World Changers" group.

Emma will be filming some training for schools and parishes on making the most of the resources we are providing to all schools during the week of 8th April. This will include:

- > Making best use of Classroom worship to encourage a rhythm of worship across the week.
- > Making best use of the Popbox to support child-led collective worship in schools and intergenerational worship in Church.
- > How to use the song catalogue from i-sing-pop in school and Church.

During the first week in July we have allocated a week to Leaver's services. We are going to focus some of these on Alcester Deanery as there are a number of schools who have been in vacancy for an extended period. If other parishes would like their schools to be involved and host a leavers service they are asked to get in touch with April Gold.

New Agreed Syllabus for RE - This will be launched in April. The syllabus takes a Worldviews approach and has already attracted praise from Professor Trevor Cooling from Canterbury Christ Church University as *the first of its kind*.

Increasing SEND Needs - Schools are continuing to report an explosion in SEND needs amongst their cohorts. This is particularly pronounced in children who were born in the pandemic. There are also increasing numbers of children and families with mental health needs who are being supported by schools. We pray that this is an opportunity for the Church to come alongside and help support families in crisis.

PRAYER JOTTINGS – APRIL 2024

Extracts from Chris Webb 'God-Soaked Life' (ch 4, Close to the Father's Heart) and Mark Oakley 'The Collage of God' (ch 3, Poetry)

Chris Webb says, 'we long to experience God in silence, prayer and Scripture...the deepest yearning of our human hearts, whether we recognise it, or not, is for this experience of intimacy with God.' The psalms say, 'In God alone my soul waits in silence' (62.1) and 'my soul thirsts for you, my flesh faints for you' (63.1). There is a strong emotional component here ... the Welsh word hiraeth means 'my body is homesick for you.' It is a longing for the stories, the songs, the familiar faces that have shaped our entire lives. He says, 'we are a people of holy hiraeth' (p. 82). In John 10, the sheep that follow, do so because they know his voice (v. 4), but so much over and above this, a mutual knowing, just as the Father and Jesus know each other, deeply. The Spiritual Canticle of St John of the Cross records his being 'driven more deeply into the heart of God' (p. 91) – through a holiness of life (turning), growth in knowledge (knowing) and being swallowed up in Christ's love (abiding)

Mark Oakley speaks of poetry as being **like 'matches struck in the dark'** – 'The power of poetry is that by simply naming it can illuminate' (Elizabeth Jennings) He says 'I believe that the Church today needs to be a poetic Church.'



As soon as we encounter God we know that we are beginning a relationship in which our thoughts, feelings, words and grammar have to plead for a little forgiveness

He is placing a higher value on language which is verbal, ritualistic, musical and figurative, believing that we should 'feel more able to befriend the artists, writers and poets of today with more open and trustful willingness'.

'Cathedrals (by their beauty of stone, liturgy, and music) are having some of the most reflective and lively partnerships between contemporary arts and faith' (p. 36)

Human beings need intimation as well as specification. At a church in busy Covent Garden, London, young people 'visit ... day by day, to pray, to draw upon the building's quiet, and sense of presence.'



Appreciation for creation was a significant factor in the spiritual experience and writings of saints like John of the Cross, Hildegard of Bingen and

Francis of Assisi. In their own poetic writings, they were inspired directly by the Old Testament book, *Song of Songs;* John of the Cross wrote 'A Spiritual Canticle', while St Francis wrote his own 'Canticle of the Sun' right at the end of his life.

- New from the Cageless Birds <u>A Guided Prayer of Rejoicing</u> which is an exploration of prayer with visually stunning widescreen footage of a seashore.
- St Mark's, Coventry, used pastoral themes from the Bible in a stimulating Lent Prayer booklet 'Prepare the Ground' this year Digging, Ploughing, Raking, Levelling, Fertilising, Planting shaped prayer over a six-week period, concluding, 'As we have cooperated with the Holy Spirit over this Lent we have prepared our ground so it is more ready to receive what God may want to plant in us, the kingdom seed that will produce a crop that will bring glory to God.'
- Each month we focus on a different Deanery; this month it is
 Rugby. In May we will pray for Alcester Deanery, then in June Fosse
 Deanery, in July Coventry South, and August, Shipston Deanery. I
 look forward to receiving updates from area deans and clergy, and
 anyone else with specific prayer requests.
- And coming up the Themes for the next 3 months are, New Worshipping Communities (May), Growing Leaders (June), and Healthy Churches (July). Do consider sending me your prayer suggestions, and any other jottings.

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
