LENT....BE STILL, OUR FRIDAY PRAYER THEME FOR MARCH – reflection from Craig Groocock, Diocesan Spirituality Advisor

The theme this month is **Lent: Be Still.** Often a season, of course, of richly symbolic acts of worship, sublime music and shared, simple meals. Perhaps this year we might allow ourselves to cultivate a season of silent prayer, of being still.

The season of Lent lasts for forty days (not including Sundays). It is a time when Christians reflect and prepare for the celebrations of Easter. Some people fast, eat frugally or give up treats following the example of Jesus, who fasted for forty days in the wilderness. People also give to charity, set aside time to study the Bible and meet with other Christians to reflect on Jesus' life and prepare for the events of Holy Week and Easter.

Craig Groocock, Shottery Rector, has been in his role as Diocesan Spirituality Advisor since Autumn 2020. In case you missed it there is a super interview with Bishop John dating back to November that year, ending with the bishop's prayer for Craig that God would 'help us to hear what God is saying to us'.

We heard about Craig's journey from conventional Anglican church involvement to personal faith in Jesus Christ as a teenager. A sense of call to share this good news with children and young people. Subsequent calls to work with the Church Army and Church of England along with his wife, Su.

The experienced treasures of Pentecostalism, Anglo-Catholicism and parish ministry in Southam and Shottery over fifteen years had at their core a deepening desire for *passionate* spirituality. And questions like 'what is He asking of me?' have led to an openness to the kernel of faith in Christ Jesus and desire to prioritise communities of deeper discipleship across the Diocese.

Craig continues to explore the opportunities the role affords, and has spoken at a number of Deanery Synods as well as with specific churches and supports spiritual accompaniers and individuals with a call to explore spirituality in specific ways. He is currently planning a Lent talk for Shipston Deanery and in discussion about forming a new monastic community within the Diocese.

He is characteristically low key about his influence so far, but is convinced that "spirituality is multi-faceted and should enable all of us to be more connected with ourselves as well as with God". Many have found themselves to be wounded through life experiences, yet embracing these challenges is invariably crucial to offering healing to others. The need to embody our faith is why he thinks it is so important that all of us find time to go on retreat.

Sacha's Story. Sacha Slavic described his journey with Benedictine spirituality on the Mucknell Abbey website in 2018. When we met for a curry recently, I was keen to understand the heart of his spirituality and practice as a chaplain, teacher and priest in our Diocese. Sacha returns time and time again to the balance between different aspects of his life, including study, recreation, work and of course prayer. It is as if his heart is enlarging on the journey, and he really does have a heart for whoever he encounters. His availability and readiness to respond, to be disrupted, seems to illustrate this very well – whether through chance encounters in a hospital, or measured responses to pastoral challenges at the Bablake and King Henry VIII schools, where he is chaplain.

Remember this? 10.30am, 17th February, 1959 – Stephen Verney (*Fire in Coventry*) tells us that he met with Monks Kirby Chapter, when one of the clergy said he believed that the consecration of the cathedral 'is going to be a great spiritual opportunity'. God wanted a consecrated cathedral and a 'consecrated people living round it.' So it was that they shared a Quiet Day together where an elderly priest said he thought they should meet each week. Many laughed at the impossibility of this commitment, but they made the decision to do so for three months. What had been a gathering of isolated clergy became a team, who knew and cared for one another, and where there was a willingness to admit to one another their own weaknesses. 'As they knelt together in prayer, perhaps above all as they were silent, they began to know that they belonged to one another and cared about each other's work, and that the mighty task to which they were committed and which was overwhelming them individually, was something they could tackle together in a strength greater than their own.'

Each month we focus on a different Deanery; this month it is Fosse.

PRAYER JOTTINGS – MARCH 2023

• From Tyler Staton's 'Praying Like Monks, Living Like Fools – an invitation to the Wonder and Mystery of Prayer' (Hodder & Stoughton, 2022) Chapter 2. Be Still and Know. 'Many confuse stillness with waiting for revelation. Sometimes revelation does come, and it's marvelous. But that's not the purpose of stillness. The purpose is consent. It is the daily practice of consenting to the work of God's Spirit, which is deeper than understanding or words. It is how "deep calls to deep" from our souls to his. He describes some simple steps – a ritual – to sit quietly, hand face up, and pray something simple and intentional like 'Lord, have mercy' (pages 50, 51) – Then, he says 'be quiet. Be still, Wait ... starting with 2 minutes, he suggests increasing this to 4 minutes after a month, then 6, until you get to ten minutes. One day, he says, you will look up and be able to say 'silent prayer became a lifeline, an essential. 'Give God the first word,' and 'let spoken prayer follow as a response.'

NEVER TOO LATE TO BE STILL

I have always been inspired by Paul's prayer in Ephesians chapter 3. It begins quietly and

humbly and rises to a glorious declaration of God's power with a vision of what might happen when God has His way in our lives! At the heart of it is a prayer that Paul's readers might 'know the love that surpasses knowledge'. Not just to know more *about* God's love but to *experience it more deeply*. In recent years, I have been resourced and inspired by the 24-7 Prayer movement and more recently the Order of the Mustard Seed to explore a deeper life of prayer; prayer that leads to generous living, hospitality and mission. Richard Foster¹ talks about the "contemplative love that leads us forth in partnership with God into creative and redeeming work." I think this captures so beautifully the rhythm or balance of prayer and action, retreating and advancing, being and doing!

Tom Wright's brief commentary² on Paul's prayer in Ephesians puts it like this:

"The western church has perhaps allowed itself to be lulled into thinking that prayer and action are at the opposite ends of the scale of Christian activity. On the contrary! Those who want their actions to be effective for God's kingdom should redouble their time and effort in prayer."

Although I have a passion to see individuals and Christian communities giving themselves wholeheartedly to mission and evangelism, I have long since realised that it needs to flow (or *overflow*) from a place of excitement and passion rather than duty or obligation.

So as our ministry team here in **the Alcester Minster** looked ahead to 2023 with the challenges and opportunities of mission and service in our rural communities, we realised we needed to invest more time in prayer rather than simply starting more mission activities and projects. As we contemplated the theme of 'life in all its fullness', we asked the question, "are **we** experiencing the love of God and the life He wants to give us, day by day?"

Lent seemed an ideal time to create some space to go on a journey together and the **Be Still course** from the 24-7 Prayer website was just what we needed. The course lasts 5 weeks and is centred around the verse that most of us know so well:

"Be still and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations.

I will be exalted in the earth." Psalm 46:10

This verse encourages us to stop and to listen. To enjoy His company and to give Him our full attention! To open ourselves up to God and to let Him have His way in our lives. It's something that should come naturally to us but so many people find it almost impossible to *simply be still!* As we embark on this course, we aim to learn some new *holy habits* and experience God in the stillness.

I'm encouraged to hear so many people, from different traditions, encouraging us to rediscover the ancient paths (Jer 6:16) and to find new depths in prayer. Tyler Staton³ writes:

"Stillness is the quiet space where God migrates from the periphery to the centre and prayer pours forth from the life that has God at the centre."

Perhaps this is our greatest need at this present time. To *recentre our* scattered senses and rediscover the life giving presence of God!
