St Edith's, Monks Kirby gets £59,229 grant

St Edith's Church in Monks Kirby has good reason to celebrate, as it has received a £59,229 grant from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, made possible by money raised by National Lottery players.

The much-needed funding now means church members can proceed with the urgent stonework repairs to the pinnacles on the church tower. Work is expected to start in early July.



Alongside the repair work, the Heritage Fund has given funding for a number of heritage engagement activities (both digital and in person) which all celebrate the 'architectural gem' that St Edith's Church represents. The range of planned activities were inspired by local villagers who gave suggestions about how they would best like to explore St Edith's unique heritage.

The celebration officially kicks off on Sunday 10th July between 2.00-5.00pm with a free-of-charge open afternoon and tea party which St Edith's Church. During the open afternoon, visitors will also be able to help make a replica LEGO® model of St Edith's Church which has been specially commissioned as part of the celebrations and will comprise over 15,000 LEGO® bricks! People will also be able to explore the church using a newly refreshed family heritage trail, try out bell-ringing, see some of the newly-developed digital and hard-copy heritage interpretation products, whilst listening to a short musical performance given by The St Andrew's Community Choir.

St Edith's Church is a Grade I listed building, located in Monks Kirby (one of the Revel villages) near to Rugby, Warwickshire. It is the largest parish church in Warwickshire, measuring approximately 110ft by 50ft. The first church on the site of St Edith's is said to have been founded in 917 by Ethelfleda, daughter of Alfred the Great. However, the current Priory Church of St Edith's dates from 1077, when Geoffrey de la Guerche, a Breton knight rebuilt the church.

Commenting on the award, Patricia Barnett, a church representative, said:

"We are thrilled to have received this support thanks to National Lottery players. The funding allows us to carry out urgent repairs to the church pinnacles on the tour. It also gives us an opportunity to engage people of all ages with the diverse heritage that St Edith's has on offer. This means local people will be able to have lots of fun exploring the church in person and through a range of new digital products. We will also have the chance to create a long-lasting recording in the form of a bespoke LEGO® model of the church. We are grateful to the Heritage Fund, Trinity College Cambridge, Coventry Diocese and the Warwickshire and Coventry Historic Churches Trust who have all supported us financially."

A Fresh Start

There is an interesting breed of people termed 'Futurists' or 'Futurologists'. Their particular focus or interest lies in exploring or predicting future trends and possibilities. The question of accuracy perhaps is more open to debate.

As the summer holidays approach many of us reflect on life, past, present and future hopes.

As the future develops into the present we now inhabit, we might feel disappointment, regret, anger inadequacy, or even a sense of falling short of hopes, dreams and expectations held brightly and firmly in the past. We do love to measure, assess where and how far we have come against where we hoped we would be, about the future we had imagined for ourselves. Self-recrimination might be one response. On the other hand there is also the possibility reflecting on great achievements and failing to recognize that all we have ultimately is a gift of God.

Jesus says: "I have come that you might have life in all its' fullness" (John 10.10).

Thank God that he is always in the business of enabling future possibilities for us to flourish.

St Matthew's, Salford Priors Count on Nature

St Matthew's Church Salford Priors has been full of activity! As part of the 'Churches Count on Nature' initiative, they have had visits from the Salford Beavers, Rainbows, Brownies as well as a whole KS1 trip from Salford Priors Academy. Including their own Muddy Church meet up, they have had over 90 children visit their churchyard to spot trees, lichen, birds, insects and plants.



Churches Count on Nature is a joint initiative promoted by Caring for God's Acre, A Rocha UK,

the Church of England and the Church in Wales. Between the 4th to the 12th June, the count brought local people together to discover the wildlife in their local church yard. They recorded the species they found, combining their results with others which was collated on the Beautiful Burial Ground portal within the National Biodiversity Network (NBN), a nationwide database of wildlife in the UK.



Sarah Folkes, Family Link Worker at St Matthew's says:

"It was a wonderful opportunity to be able to invite so many local children to our Churchyard for this special week. By giving young people the opportunity to experience God's creation, we are helping instil a sense of awe and wonder as well as responsibility for caring for the world around us. "

£1.8m funding for Saints, Nuneaton

Together for Change is pleased to announce that it will be receiving £1.8m to purchase and renovate the building that houses the Saints Nuneaton project.

These funds come from the bid that Nuneaton made for the central government 'Towns Fund', for which the town was awarded £23.5m. They will be used to renovate the first floor of the building, including St Georges Hall, and its surrounding rooms and facilities.



Work is expected to begin in autumn/winter 2022, with the aim of opening the doors on the new space by autumn 2023.

Jet Jones, Together for Change CEO, says:

"We have renovated the former Saints nightclub into a community hub with a training café for young people, market stalls, free children's play area and training rooms where we focus on starting enterprises and equipping people with the skills they need for life or to find work.

We survived three lockdowns and the pandemic as a small start-up business thanks to the fantastic support of the local community, and it has been wonderful to see many churches in Nuneaton get behind this project and offer volunteer support.

We are now moving on to phase two and are so grateful for this government funding which will enable us to renovate the upstairs St George's Hall which is beautiful with a wooden dance floor and stage which we want to bring back into community use to host events, functions and weddings – we already have one wedding booking!"
