Prayer Diary September 2022

Children in the Lead

In July I was lucky enough to spend a morning in the Cathedral with 350 children and staff of 5 schools in Nuneaton Deanery. The children of Stockingford Primary School, St Paul's Stockingford CofE Primary School, St Michael's CofE Primary School, All Saint's CofE Primary School and The Canons CofE Primary School came together for a service to celebrate their completion of the Archbishop of York Youth Trust (ABYYT) Young Leaders Award. Each school made a



presentation to summaries their year, and the ABYYT team created a video of the impact on staff and children which you can watch on the news story section of the diocesan website.

I spoke to the children about 3 stories in the Bible which remind us that children are at the centre of the Kingdom of God. Firstly, I reminded them of the story in Luke 2:41-52. Where Jesus stays behind in the Temple with the teachers of the law deep in discussion about God and the kingdom. Even Jesus, God incarnate, wanted to learn from the people of God who God is. The rabbis were amazed at his perceptive understanding and questions. This is an example to us of the importance of debating with children, not only are we passing on our knowledge and experience of God, but we will be amazed at their reflections and experiences of God.

The second story I told was the feeding of the 5000. In this story we see Jesus preaching to a large crowd of families. They are engrossed in what he is saying and eventually the disciples realise it is time to eat and no one has planned the catering! As the adults panic, in John's account we see a small child comes forward to the disciples and Jesus with a solution. He offers his picnic of 5 loaves and two fish. Jesus takes this offering and multiplies it and 5000 men and their families are fed with more left over. This demonstrates to us that Jesus takes what children bring and multiplies it, we should be in the habit of asking children for their ideas and expect that Jesus will bless them exponentially if we take them seriously.

Finally, I told the story in Matthew 18 when the disciples ask Jesus who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Jesus calls over a child and place him in the middle of the disciples telling them "unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." Jesus is quite clearly reminding us that children, unencumbered with the worries and realities of the world and the mistaken adult notion that we can control it and somehow earn our rank, just accept the gift. They do not need to reason, or wrestle, have evidence or rank, they just accept and allow themselves to love and be loved.

These three stories together remind us that God is our Father and we are adopted children. God wants nothing more than for us to come in wonder and faith to him as a child, when we do we will catch a glimpse of the kingdom. Please pray for the 21,000 children in Coventry Diocese schools and their families. Spend some time this month debating the kingdom with a child or young adult, or go into your local school and join in their worship, perhaps you will get a glimpse of the kingdom too!

Mission Hub at St Laurence's, Foleshill

The new Mission Hub at St Laurence's, Foleshill was launched on 12th June. The Associate Minister for the Mission Hub, Abby Rhodes, was formally licensed. Alongside Gareth Irvine and Abby, the whole team was commissioned.
