Come, Lord Jesus


I'm writing this reflection on the Feast of Christ the King, after confirming some wonderful people in the Cathedral from across the diocese. Before the service they shared with me their powerful testimonies of God at work in their lives. They told me of their readiness to confess that Jesus Christ is the King and their commitment to work for the coming of God's kingdom 'of which there shall be no end'.

By the time you read this, Advent may have arrived and thoughts will be turning to the coming of Christ in great humility, born as a child, hounded by a king and, after a short life, put to death by an Emperor.

The Feast of Christ the King is a good precursor to Advent. It helps us to keep our hearts and minds set on the double aspect of Advent. Yes, we look towards Christmas with all its images of powerlessness in the unmarried mother, the birth in homelessness, the escape from oppression to a far-off country. But we also hold that extraordinary descent of God into the cruel realities of human life alongside the glorious ascent of Jesus to the right hand of God where he reigns as Lord of Lords and King of Kings.

And so we have confidence to pray every day, 'Your kingdom come'. We await with eager longing the coming of Christ to establish throughout creation that kingdom of peace where 'justice rolls down like waters' and where 'God will wipe away every tear from our eyes'.

Let our Advent cry ring loud this year – Amen. Come, Lord Jesus

Advent 2021 resources

Advent is an exciting time in the Calendar of Christian worship; as we prepare in heart, mind and spirit for the coming of Jesus, and we want everyone to be able to join in the celebration and reflection.

To make sure that no one misses out, we are creating a full 9 Lessons and Carol service that can be downloaded for FREE, to be used by groups and individuals.

There will be a variety of content available aimed at a number of different groups. Many churches would like to host a Carol service for their local community, but struggle to find musicians – We will be providing 9 Carols as both video and audio. The videos will have the words for the Carol on screen, and there will also be a printable pdf booklet for those who would prefer to do it that way.

The idea is that you can use the resources however you want to, doing as much of the reading and leading as you want to live, and using the video and audio recordings to fill in the gaps.

In this same way, we hope that the material can be taken to Schools, Care Homes, Prison Chaplaincies, Hospital Chaplaincies and even your local pub! (If you're feeling brave enough).

The Carols will be in a mixture of traditional and more contemporary musical styles and we are choosing popular and well-known classics to be as accessible as possible. We are also going to film the prayers and readings, and create a single video of the whole service that can be watched through beginning to end. We would encourage you to share this with anyone you know who can't get out to a carol service in person.

All of the resources will be available online for download from the first week in December, to allow plenty of time to prepare before holding your event. It will also allow time for the content to be shared more widely with others who may benefit from it.

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

Loving the Enemy

Last month, debutant author, Andy March released the biography of his grandparents, Englishman Fred Clayton and German woman Rike Büttner-Wobst from Dresden, who rose above extreme suffering and defied the hatred and enmity of warring nations to build an enduring bridge of love.

Andy March is vicar of St Christopher's, Coventry.

Andy travelled as part of a group from Coventry to Dresden in February 2015 to join in the commemorations marking 70 years since the city was bombed and stand with our former enemies, now friends, to declare that love must overcome



hate. It was a visit that left an indelible mark on Andy and provided the catalyst for the creation of *Loving the Enemy*. The Bishop of Coventry, Christopher Cocksworth, was also part of that trip and has written the foreword for *Loving the Enemy*.

Loving the Enemy tells the compelling true story of Fred Clayton, a grammar schoolboy from Liverpool, and brilliant Cambridge scholar, who leaves the comfort of the halls of Cambridge at the beginning of the Nazi era and makes a troubled journey to discover first-hand what life must be like to live under the despotic regime. Arriving in Dresden, he develops a friendship with a German family that will change his life.

Through the course of the next decade, with his and their nations at war, Fred will not forget the connections that have been made and refuses to allow hate to win. After the war, with Dresden in ruins, reflecting his own state of mind, Fred writes to the same German family. Will he find the healing, love and redemption he seeks?

Bishop Christopher says;

"It is my hope that, thanks to Andy's efforts, the story will inspire you as much as it has inspired me, and that it will find its place as a signpost, even a landmark, along the path of reconciliation, trust and love which links Coventry and Dresden; Britain and Germany."

1.25 million grant for a younger and more diverse church

Lunch clubs, a community choir and a church that grew out of a football team for refugees are among a number of different projects to receive funding as part of a drive by the Church of England to spread the Christian message to younger and more diverse groups.

The Diocese of Coventry is to receive £1.25 million in Strategic Development Funding (SDF) for outreach work in parishes serving estates and suburban areas in the city of Coventry and the Warwickshire town of Bedworth. The projects are part of a plan to create 150 new worshipping communities in the diocese by 2030, reaching children and young people, families, elderly people and other groups such as homeless people and refugees and asylum seekers.

The funding will support activities such as a community choir, holiday and lunch clubs, pastoral support and Christian enquiry courses. In Bedworth, new worshipping communities will meet in venues including a working men's club and a school.

A 'fledgling' church community that grew out of English language lessons and a football team for refugees and asylum seekers in Coventry will be helped to expand and set up a multi lingual service at St Peter's in Hillfields in the city.

Overall, the grant will support outreach work in the Coventry churches of St Peter's, St Oswald's Tile Hill, Holy Cross, Caludon, St Mary Magdalene with the Church of the Risen Christ, Wyken and All Saints Bedworth.

The grant has been awarded as the Church of England outlines priorities in its Vision and Strategy for the future, including doubling the number of children and young people in churches and attracting more diverse congregations..

The Bishop of Coventry, Dr Christopher Cocksworth, said:

"This is a big moment in the Diocese of Coventry as we venture out on a life-giving work to build up our church communities and reach deeper into some of the most disadvantaged parishes in the diocese."
