Together, let us shine with the light of your love

As January turns to February this year, we celebrate Candlemas, this very special time of remembering when the infant Jesus was taken to be presented in the Temple, and the elderly Simeon and Anna saw in this baby all that God was promising, for the future. It was for them the point at which God's promises became a reality, the fulcrum between the past and the future. It is the crucial point that our world still needs today – that God's plan did not stop with the birth of his Son, and cannot be thrown out with the Christmas tree. It is just the beginning of his incarnate presence among us, and we need to see beyond it.

But it took Simeon and Anna, with all their years behind them, to hold this baby, gaze in wonder at him, and translate his presence to the young couple before them and the world around them. It took the two of them, who had long been, in Pope Francis' words, 'wasting time in adoration before the Lord', to understand this. The young family, and the world outside, needed them; equally Simeon and Anna needed to hold Jesus in their arms.

Young and old needed each other, and were incomplete without each other. It is surely one of the many great sadnesses of Covid that a gulf appears at times between old and young. But we do need each other, and are incomplete without each other. This has been as difficult in our churches as anywhere, but we pray that once again, across the generations, in whatever way, we may hold each other, pray our blessings on each other, depend on and support each other, and that together we may walk in the fullness of God's light and love, moving from the crib to the cross.

To adapt the words of the Candlemas Acclamation:

Together, we stand near the place of new birth. Together, we turn from the crib to the cross. Together, we go to carry his light. Together, let us shine with the light of your love.

Fairtrade Fortnight

For two weeks each year at the end of February and start of March, thousands of individuals, companies and groups across the UK come together to share the stories of the people who grow our food and drinks, mine our gold and who grow the cotton in our clothes; people who are often exploited and underpaid.



In 2022, Fairtrade Fortnight runs from Monday 21 February until Sunday 6 March and is even more crucial this year as the global economy recovers from Covid-19. Since last year, the G7 and COP26 have both taken place. Over 33,000 campaigners joined 1.8m Fairtrade farmers and workers in backing the Be Fair With Your Climate Promise challenge to world leaders at the UN COP26 summit. But frustration came as the wealthiest nations failed to recognise the urgent need to invest in farmer expertise by delaying their promised \$100bn annual funding to the most climate vulnerable countries until 2023.

Throughout the fortnight, an online *Choose the World you Want* Festival will run with people coming together in a show of support for the farmers behind our food on the front line of the climate crisis.

Please pray for fairness and justice in all economic dealings and especially for small producers in developing economies, that they may receive a fair price for what they produce. Pray that consumers make informed choices.

We are all part of the Fairtrade movement and have the power to drive long-term change, not only with our shopping choices but in spreading the message. What difference will you make during Fairtrade Fortnight this year?

Coventry Community of the Cross of Nails wins award

At a ceremony on December 11th 2021, the Coventry Community of the Cross of Nails (CCN) was awarded an 'Ecumenical Prize' by the Munich Katholische Akademie.

The prestigious award, which recognises the Community of the Cross of Nails' transformative work in worldwide reconciliation, but especially within



Germany, was accepted by the Dean of Coventry, John Witcombe.

The award will enable the CCN to further expand its mission, particularly with young people. Representatives from the German Community of the Cross of Nails, including chairman Dr Oliver Schuegraf, were present to convey the story of the CCN and its work through different churches and institutions in Germany, including, closest to Munich itself, Dachau Concentration Camp. Reinhard Caridal Marx, the Archbishop of Munich and Freising and a previous recipient of the prize (in conjunction with Lutheran Bishop Heinrich Bedford-Strohm) was also present to share his appreciation for the work of the CCN. Bishop Christopher contributed a lecture entitled 'The Messsage of Coventry in Europe Today'. The event concluded with the Coventry Litany of Reconciliation.

The afternoon saw Bishop Christopher take part in a panel discussion entitled 'A Culture of Remembrance' together with Dr Schuegraf and Professor Aleida Assmann.

On the previous evening an Ecumenical prayer service was held at St Barbara Kirche in Munich, a former garrison church and now member of the Community of the Cross of Nails. The service was led by Cardinal Marx, Dean John and Bishop Christopher.

I look forward to welcoming Rob in the near future and working with him."

Rob said:

"I'm really looking forward to be returning to the Diocese of Coventry, where my life in full time Christian ministry began in 1984. I left Coventry to start Theological College and now return with thirty three years' experience in parish ministry (some full time, some part time) in four very different communities in Southampton and London. At times I have had a parallel career in broadcasting, communication and writing.

Christian ministry in the twenty first century is consistently requiring us to learn new skills, and to look from fresh perspectives. (When COVID appeared, we had to do that very rapidly.) I'm greatly looking forward to working with clergy and lay people across the diocese as we support each other in doing the best we can for God and his Gospel."

Rob will be taking up the post that was recently vacated by Richard Cooke. He will be starting on 11 April.
