Sally will be starting this new role on 1 September.

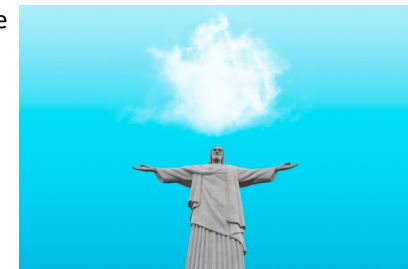


# Prayer Diary

## July 2021

### Being part of The Body of Christ

Early this month, we will be welcoming into the Diocese of Coventry some new deacons and new priests. Their ordinations will be a really joyful event for them and their families and friends, but it is also an occasion for the whole Church to celebrate that these faithful Christians have been prepared to offer themselves for ministry in God's Church and to undergo a whole process of discernment, selection and training which has led them to this point.



As we pray for them and celebrate with them, it is also an occasion for all of us to reflect on what it means to be part of the Body of Christ. You will recall St. Paul's description of the Body of Christ in his first letter to the Corinthians, Chapter 12, where he likens the Body of Christ to a human body, with each part of the body having a different but necessary function in order that the whole body can work together and flourish. Those who are being ordained this month are called to fulfil specific roles within the Church and their communities. They are called to be public representatives of God and the Church in the world. The Body of Christ, the Church, consists of all baptized Christians and each of us has that calling, that special gift to offer, not through ordination but through baptism. The Church will only be able fully to live out its calling if each of us discerns what God is asking of us and offers the gift of our lives to God.

I wonder what God is calling each of you to do? What is the special gift that he has given you with which to serve Him? If you would like to explore this more, you might like to consider speaking to one of your clergy or registering for a course ([www.coventry.anglican.org/called-vocations-courses.php](http://www.coventry.anglican.org/called-vocations-courses.php)) to help with that discernment? Often through exploring our vocation, we discover that God is calling us to be where we are now but just sometimes, He leads us into new places and new experiences and, if He does, we can trust that He will be with us each step of the way.

'A Cathedral Adventure' tells the story of Popcorn, a grey squirrel. Popcorn lives by Coventry Cathedral with her family, and one day decides to go exploring. Before long she finds herself trapped and alone in the great big Cathedral. What will she do next?



This heart-warming story follows Popcorn on her exciting adventure where she finds jungles, angels and treasure, and is helped by the friendly man in the green tapestry. The book is 32 pages and is aimed at five to eight-year-olds but is for everyone to enjoy!

Naomi Nixon has always loved using stories and creativity to bring meaning, insight and joy. She is the CEO of the Student Christian Movement (SCM) and an Associate Priest at Coventry Cathedral, where she is a leader of the St Clare's Community. She has extensive experience of using her creativity in training, teaching and preaching.

Sarah Palmer has always loved drawing and painting; she has a degree in Graphic Design from Coventry University and an MA in Children's Book Illustration from the Cambridge School of Art. Her favourite thing is creating and developing characters, so bringing Popcorn and her adventure to life was a joy.

Revd Naomi says:

*"I'm so excited about the book finally being ready to buy, it's a bit of a childhood ambition come true! Not that I could have imagined writing a book to introduce a place of such powerful meaning to children, but once the idea for Popcorn's journey had taken hold in my mind I couldn't wait to write it down. Sarah's illustrations though are what really make it, we know this building is beautiful but the illustrations from a squirrel's eye view bring a whole new perspective!"*

# Compassionate Rugby



University Hospitals Coventry and Warwickshire (UHCW) NHS Trust has launched Compassionate Rugby, a community movement to help Rugby recover from Covid-19.

Many people live with feelings of loneliness and don't feel they belong to a community, however during the pandemic there was a strong positive reaction from communities which helped bring people together with many people reaching out to support each other, often connecting with their neighbours for the first time.

Compassionate Rugby appeals to this same spirit and hopes to build a movement of compassion to ensure that the Rugby community is able to continue supporting each other.

Head of Compassionate Communities, the Revd Simon Betteridge, Chaplain at UHCW, explained what the initiative will mean to the Rugby community:

*"Compassionate Rugby is a movement through which it is hoped that people of different ages and backgrounds will join together, learning more about each other, and creating new ways to support one another and celebrate what it means to be part of the community in Rugby."*

The movement started this month with Story Circles, where people are given a voice and an opportunity to share their experiences with others in their community. Story Circles are a simple, powerful way to get to know each other better, and for everyone to be valued and heard. Open to everyone – individuals, businesses, community groups, young and old.
