October 2021

My youngest grandchild loves blackberries straight from the bushes. It is no good taking him blackberry picking – he will have eaten them all before we get home. For him, having this wonderful food there for the taking is beyond exciting.

Autumn is here. And with it God's bounty of crops, vegetables and flowers, ready to sustain us and our livestock over the winter. Rightly we celebrate that abundant harvest in

thanksgiving, that sign of his steadfast love. There is also a wonderful 'harvest of community, of our common life together', and that too we celebrate. Over the summer we thought about the bread of life, and what it means to allow God to feed us. Autumn reminds us that he delights in feeding us constantly and in abundance: may we discover anew this autumn the excitement of having God's food there for the taking.

Alongside the things we gather for food, there are also seeds and seed heads, some tiny, some majestic. These will be scattered to the elements, to bring new life next spring. They may well have uncertain journeys, and who knows where they will land, but from them new plants will grow. And they do need to be scattered for the new plants to thrive. What seeds are we as churches looking to scatter right now: are we willing to take chances to trust things to God, so that he can do the growing?

Finally, of course, autumn is full of fallen leaves, rotten fruits and withered plants. It may seem wasteful, but look closely and you will see they provide homes and food for a whole microcosm of small creatures and insects. What is not used will rot down to enrich the soil, and so feed a future generation of plants. Nothing is wasted in God's economy. What are the things that we, as both individuals and churches, need to allow to fall, or let go? It often seems sad and difficult at the time, but God does not let anything go to waste. The experiences and insights we have gained, the knowledge we can pass on, the sustaining prayer we can offer, all will be used to feed the next generation. May we then celebrate God's presence in our lives this Autumn: this special time of harvest, of letting go and looking ahead to new life.

# Welcome to our new Readers



On Sunday 5th September, five new Readers were admitted and licensed into the diocese during a service at Coventry Cathedral.
